

Bryan Crocker – Co–Artistic Director



Bryan has been conducting choirs since 2000 when he was appointed Artistic Director of the Dalhousie Health Professions Chorale. Previous to that he enjoyed being a professional saxophonist in Halifax playing with such artists/events as Ice Capades, The Moscow Circus, The Temptations, The Spinners, Rosemary Clooney, Dionne Warwick, the John Alphonse Big Band and many others.

Since that time, Bryan has continued to expand his conducting skills and besides Nova Voce he is also the

first Artistic Director of the Halifax Gay Men's Chorus (HGMC).

Bryan sings baritone with the acclaimed Halifax Camerata Singers and is a longstanding member of the Sackville Concert Band playing baritone saxophone. He is involved with the Nova Scotia Choral Federation, and sits on a number of planning committees, both provincially and nationally. Between weekends, in his free moments, Bryan is a full-time clinical manager with Information Management & Information Technology at the Nova Scotia Health Authority.

Lynn Pelton – Accompanist



Lynn Pelton, pianist and former music educator, is a graduate of Nova Scotia Teachers College and Mount Allison University (B.Mus. Major in Performance and Music History). Lynn has previously accompanied many choirs and string groups, including Aeolian Singers, N.S. Choral Federation workshops and Halifax Metro Honour Choirs. Many of the school choirs she has conducted won several awards at the N.S. Kiwanis Music Festival. In addition to working with local choral conductors, she has had

the opportunity to work with many well known choral clinicians including Mark Sirett, Mark Ramsay and Charles Bruffy.

Bill Perrot – Co–Artistic Director

Bill graduated from Westminster Choir College Princeton, NJ, in 1975 and has been involved in school, church and community choirs since his arrival in Nova Scotia. He has been active in the Nova Scotia Choral Federation since its inception in 1976 and is also a Charter Life Member of Choral Canada. Bill is the founding conductor of Kings Chorale, a community choir established in 1982. In addition, he has conducted the Annapolis Valley Honour Choir, the Acadia University Chorus, the Acadia Vocal Ensemble, and NSCF's Youth Choir Camp. He has



prepared choirs for Symphony Nova Scotia performances as well as for concerts with the Nova Scotia Youth Orchestra. In 1994, he was the Master Conductor for the Rotary Youth Choir in Halifax, now the Nova Scotia Youth Choir. In May of 2008, Bill was given the Alumni Merit Award from Westminster Choir College for his work with choirs, particularly youth choirs, in Nova Scotia. Bill is extremely pleased to be sharing the podium with Bryan Crocker as Co-Artistic Director.

Terry Hurrell – Director Emeritus

After training as a music educator in England, Terry, together with his wife Stephanie, came to Nova Scotia in 1967, and he became deeply involved in the music scene. An educator, innovator, music director, and vocalist, Terry found his niche in choral music. He has been the founding music director of such diverse



groups as the Lockeport Male Choir, Liverpool Boys' Choir, Halifax Boys Honour Choir, Queens County Community Choir, Nova Scotia Youth Chamber Choir, and two church handbell choirs. He is also the former Choral Conductor of Jubilate Singers. He is an Honorary Life Member of the Nova Scotia Music Educators' Association. Terry is the founding Artistic Director of Nova Voce. He led the choir from January

2004 until his retirement in December 2010.



It seems like yesterday that a group of 60 of us were sitting in the basement of Bedford Baptist Church. Once I heard everyone singing, I was hooked. I felt truly fortunate to be in that first group. I was shocked to find out I made the cut after our original auditions.

NORM SCRIMGER - TENOR I



Twenty years ago, I attended the Amherst Workshop for Male Voices hosted by Chor Leoni and Diana Loomer which spawned the founding of Nova Voce. Singing in a choir of 100 male voices was phenomenal, with a sound that only a men's choir can make, so I was eager to audition for the tenor section of Nova Voce under Terry Hurrell and Joe Renzi. That first season we sang music written specifically for the male voice, including such marvels as Spaseniye and Dostoyno Yest from the Russian Liturgy as well as folk pieces such as Loch Lomond, Shenandoah, and Wood River.

Since then, the repertoire has grown to include many Canadian pieces as well as music written in more than a dozen languages (some arranged by our own artistic directors and bass, Byron Hermann). We also have debuted many works written specifically for us. We share much of our music throughout Nova Scotia, Atlantic Canada and on Canadian and international tours. Touring is a wonderful way to make new friendships with other choir members. I found out I am not the only tenor who is a bass before my morning coffee kicks in!

TOM BLACK - BASS

It is alleged that Yogi Berra once said, "When you come to a fork in the road, take it." A random act. In looking at the history of Nova Voce, the effect of a random act, is quite astounding.

My journey with Nova Voce began with an innocent statement, "There is a choral workshop for men in Amherst next weekend. You should go." After some internal yes/no arguments, I went. The workshop was with Diane Loomer and about forty members



of Chor Leoni and had about seventy participants from the Maritimes. At the close of the workshop, Diane challenged the group to form an east coast "bookend" choir to her Chor Leoni.

That summer, an email was sent out, asking if there was interest in forming a choir. After the Amherst experience, this was worth a drive to Halifax (I was living in Oxford at the time). There was interest! From Metro, the Valley, the South Shore and me from Northern NS.

If I had to pick just one memory from 20 years, it is not possible.

What is memorable are the people, the close friendships that have been made. The road with no bumps doesn't take you anywhere that is interesting. There have been highs and lows. The highs have been fantastic and the lows are when this band of brothers stick together to support one another.
